2019-2020 PTA Budget Committee -

Process Updates and Proposed Budget

The 2019 PTA Budget Committee would like to thank staff and PTA event chairs for budget feedback, submissions, and overall collaboration. Through discussions with Principal Deese and staff at the December and January general PTA meeting, we learned that historically the PTA budget presentation and vote occurred in May AFTER the school's budget was due to Seattle Public Schools in March. It was clear that the process could benefit from more close coordination with the school and their budget deadlines. Therefore, we ramped up our schedule and the committee met in January, twice in February (during SNOWMAGEDDEN) and again in March. In addition, we attended the Principal Budget Coffee Chats to hear feedback and discussion directly from parents.

As a reminder, our expense categories are school grants (library, hourly staff, counselor, WITS, supplies, etc.), self-sustaining PTA events (auction, musical, alki-a-thon, etc.), PTA community events (breakfasts, socials, staff appreciation, etc.) and operations (insurance, software subscription, printing fees, etc.). The percentage breakdown of each category can be found in last month's Currents and the Alki PTA handbook.

Aside from the timeline adjustment, we made three other process changes:

- Committee presentation and minimum grant vote (February)
- School grants grouped with similar expenses into categories (February)
- School grants reviewed in detail and proposed by Principal Deese and Building Leadership Team ("BLT") (March)

The Budget Committee presented to the membership mid-way through the process at the February PTA General Meeting. Historical budget data from the prior three school years was shown as well as a roll-forward of future impact based on projected fundraising and spending. We also reviewed key terms and definitions from the WA State PTA Handbook. The discussion was plentiful and feedback greatly appreciated. The staff attendance was nearly identical to the parent representation which was so valuable for everyone. (Thank you, teachers!)

At the end of the meeting, there was a motion, discussion, and vote from membership on a minimum amount of \$120,000 to grant to the school.

Rather than the Budget Committee analyzing the school grants line-by-line and each dollar, we left it in the staff's capable hands. The PTA school grant funds were combined with the funds received from SPS and Principal Deese and the BLT will propose the spending allocations based on that larger pot of money.

Their process included receiving feedback from staff, students, and parents as well as looking into other funding options. Additionally, through feedback directly received from a parent at coffee chat and in coordination with the Budget Committee, similar expense items will be grouped together into sub headings. For instance, supplies will encompass P.E. equipment, playground equipment, folders, art supplies, etc. This provides flexibility within the budget based on the needs of the students and school in a given year, without compromising transparency into spending. The BLT team will be presenting the overall school budget to the PTA general membership on **Thursday, March 7, 2019 at 6:30 pm** and the staff vote is on March 13th .

The next task for the committee was to evaluate the remaining expenditures and income items. Notable changes include morphing Razzle Dazzle into a spring Community Inclusion event which combines budgets and reduces those expenses from \$1,500 down to \$650. We were able to entirely eliminate website fees and a few other small operation expenses without compromising quality and the self-sustaining Musical received an uptick in both the income and expense categories.

The 2019 budget committee thanks you for your thoughtful consideration of the proposed budget. Please plan to attend the **March 7th general PTA meeting at 6:30pm-7:30pm** for both BLT and PTA budget presentations, discussion, and voting!

ADVOCACY CORNER

How Do We Support Students, Families, Staff, and a Fundraising Goal of over \$150,000?

In our February PTA meeting we broke out into small groups to discuss the financial asks from the school, our own programs we wanted to support, and the operating costs needed to make all that happen. We did an exercise where we used cards representing the program asks from the school and tried to prioritize and see where we could make cuts. The counselor, the playground support staff, and budget for academic interventionists were all on the table.

As a result of those conversations with our membership, our March General PTA meeting, our budget committee will be submitting to our membership a budget of over \$170,000 for 2019 -2020. Filled with crucial programs that support student success.

At our Board meeting last week as we got ready for the March General meeting, the Board was asking tough questions about how the PTA can sustain itself to support Alki. With so many programs to support and such a huge financial ask, how do we carry this weight? We talked about having more parent representation at the table. We need to not only find next year's PTA Board but new ideas to reach all parents in our community. What came of this discussion was an idea from Mel Spiker to rethink and reimagine to create a robust Room Parent program.

We did some quick math. We have about 380 students in 16 classrooms. If we had 2 parents from each class, plus board roles we could have a team of almost 40 people. That is just 10% of the school but would dramatically change parent access to information and getting their voices heard.

Does this sound good to you? More representation, more voices heard, less work for everyone? If so, help us think through how to make it happen and join the **Nomination Committee** and begin shaping the 2019-2020 PTA. It's a short commitment and members of the committee have an opportunity to shape what happens in our community in a very unique way. Email advocacy@alkipta.com if you are interested.
